As we walked out of Tech Savvy day, feeling exhausted and accomplished at the same time, I overheard a young middle school girl approach Elizabeth Braatz and ask, "What do you think I should be? An engineer, an actress, or an astrophysicist?" She had just heard Elizabeth talk about "taking flight" and her own journey into a STEM career. Elizabeth inspired the girls to love learning new things, join clubs in high school, find what interests them, challenge themselves to learn things that might seem difficult, and appreciate the support of parents and teachers along the way. (Honestly...we were all inspired.) And here was this young girl, proudly wearing her yellow Tech Savvy shirt and carrying milkweed seeds to plant...and imagining her own future flight. This young girl carried all the power inside herself at that moment.

But as we approach April 2, Equal Pay Day...is just "imagining better" all we need? If that was true, then in 1922 AAUW's support of the repeal of salary restrictions in the Women's Bureau of the Civil Service would have been enough. And then in 1955 when AAUW supported a non-partisan bill requiring "equal pay for work of comparable value requiring comparable skills"...well, that would have been enough. Boom. Done. Well, not done. In 1963 with the support of AAUW, Congress finally enacted the Equal Pay Act. Finally! Now we're there! Um...nope. Newsflash: January, 2019, the Paycheck Fairness Act is introduced to update and strengthen the 1963 act, attempting to close loopholes and have consequences for non-compliance. And our individual and collective voice is still needed to ensure progress will be made. We provide the voice, AAUW provides the megaphone.

From the AAUW website: "Equal Pay Day is the symbolic day when women's earnings catch up to men's earnings from the previous year. Despite the Equal Pay Act, the gender pay gap persists; women are typically paid just 80 cents for every dollar paid to men." Though we celebrate April 2 for all women, the actual dates are, well, horrible. For Asian American women, March 5. For white women, April 19. For black women, August 22. For Native American women, September 23. For Latina women, November 20.

Can we imagine better? We sure can. Is imagining enough? No…it really isn't. We need to act as well. And that young girl walking out of a day of coding and creating, building Lego cars and building confidence? We will do it for her.

### Voting for a Change: The Impact of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment on Our Community Thursday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, 7:00 pm Neenah Public Library

Join the Neenah Historical Society at the Neenah Library for an overview of the next exhibit at the Octagon House. Professor Steven Sheehan will present an overview of the exhibit and some of the interesting stories that have been discovered relative to the local women's suffrage movement. This year marks the one hundredth anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment in Wisconsin, which was the first state to vote in favor of ratification. Our local women had a very significant impact on its passage!

Plan on joining the Travel Group in May to visit the Hiram Smith Octagon House in Neenah to see the exhibit: Voting for a Change - The Impact of the 19th Amendment on our Community that highlights the 100th anniversary of women's right to vote in the United States and how local women championed this cause. The exhibit also features "modern" gadgets to help women in the early 1900s, the clothing they wore and how it was changing, and the struggles women underwent to help our state and country achieve voting rights for women. Visitors will be able to cast their ballot in the 1920 election in an early voting booth, discover political cartoons of the time, and learn about leaders who influenced participation by women in all spheres of our community. 



