## **AAUW** : National Focus

As the 2020 presidential campaign gets underway, the power of women is on full display.

Maybe it's that there are so many women in the race — the largest number in history — or because the candidates are eager to earn our support. Whatever the reason, the issues that matter most to us are *finally* getting attention.

As a non-partisan organization, AAUW doesn't endorse specific candidates. But that doesn't mean we're not advocates for the policies that matter most to us. Indeed, we have a long history of championing policies that advance equality for women in education and the workplace.

So, in the months ahead, AAUW will be watching closely to see where candidates stand on these five issues:

**Equal Pay for Equal Work.** To close the stubborn wage gap, we need leaders who will pass the federal <u>Paycheck Fairness</u> <u>Act</u> and advocate for laws and policies that ensure women are not discriminated against at work.

**Investing in Education.** Education is the pathway for women and girls, but too many of our schools are falling short. We need to raise teacher pay, invest in <u>STEM education</u>, protect <u>Title IX</u> and make education a top national priority.

**Reducing Student Debt.** Women hold two-thirds of the nation's \$1.46 trillion <u>educational debt</u>. Policymakers should protect grant programs, champion tuition- and debt-free options and expand loan forgiveness programs.

**Strengthening Social Security.** Because of lower wages and time off from work, women collect about \$320 a month less than men do in Social Security benefits. Our lawmakers need to <u>address the retirement wage gap</u> women face.

**Implementing Paid Leave.** The U.S. is the only developed country without paid family and sick leave. Let's <u>adopt policies</u> to give workers paid time off for illness and caregiving.

You know how much is at stake in the next election. So, please, do what you've done in the past: Tune in, get involved, make your voices heard — and ensure that we harness the power of women to drive the national agenda.







#### LEGISLATORS EARN GRADES, TOO!



<u>Fox Cities Advocates for Public Education</u> commends the public schools of the Fox Cities for their ongoing tradition of excellence. We also commend the dedicated educators and staff who provide the care and instruction needed for all children to become valued citizens of our communities.

Our public schools connect us to our communities and to each other, and are vital to a democratic society. Therefore, Wisconsin has traditionally prioritized the funding of public schools. Unfortunately, the 2019-21 budget failed to provide essential and much-needed resources for public schools. Fox Cities public school districts continue to face significant challenges: unpredictable and often insufficient state aid; frequently changing and often unfunded state mandates; and growing student needs that require increased investments.

Special education funding is one such area of concern. In this year's budget, the state reimbursement of special education costs was increased to 26% (from 25.3%). The meager increases do not keep pace with inflation, much less address ever-increasing student needs. To fill the shortfall, Fox Cities public school districts must continue to transfer funding from general education to cover these mandated services. "Robbing Peter to pay Paul" is not the way to fund public education.

It is vital that lawmakers work with public school districts to ensure that all students thrive. Creating a complex system of 'accountability' that blames schools for things they cannot control does not result in student success. It is time to hold lawmakers accountable for the one thing they can control: **Their Vote!**

We expect the best from our students and our educators. We also expect the best from the lawmakers who represent them. We can and must do better for the 36,000 public school students in the Fox Cities.
