In September 2020, after taking up no bills during a special session called by the governor, Wisconsin Assembly Speaker Robin Vos created the Task Force on Racial Disparities. The 32-member task force is responsible for crafting recommendations surrounding racial disparities, educational opportunities, public safety and police policies and standards in Wisconsin. One subcommittee will focus on law enforcement policies and procedures while the other will examine education and economic development.



Influential Women STEM Essay Contest 2021

AAUW-Appleton would like to invite Fox Valley students in grades 6-8 to participate in an essay contest called **Influential Women...Then and Now**. This initiative recognizes March as Women's History Month. The contest has a STEM focus and students are asked to write about a woman who made a difference in science, technology, engineering, and math and tell why the woman is significant to them.

The contest guidelines, along with the link to the online application, are listed below. School administrators will be sent the application with guidelines along with a public address announcement, newsletter announcement and posters. We hope are asking them to distribute the information to the appropriate classroom teachers, the media center, etc. and encourage students to participate.

Contest Guidelines:

- All students in grades 6-8
- Typed essay on a Woman in History with a STEM focus. Tell us why you selected the woman. What is the personal impact of her STEM contribution?
- Essays should be no more than 700 words and should include bibliography or sources.
 Essays will go through a check for plagiarism.
- Essays longer than 700 words or essays without bibliography or sources will not be considered for the contest.



Equal Pay Day denotes how far into the new year women must work to be paid what men were paid the previous year. Started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996, the goal was to raise awareness about the gender wage gap. Since then, other Equal Pay Days have been added to the calendar to denote that mothers and most women of color face a wider-than-average gap and need to work even longer to catch up to men's earnings.

Asian-American Women's Equal Pay Day is February 11. Asian-American women are paid 90 cents for every dollar paid to white men.

AAUW has developed a free program to learn to successfully advocate for yourself – and help close the pay gap for women everywhere. Through Work Smart Online you can research your target salary, highlight your accomplishments and find the right words – and the confidence – to negotiate for better benefits and pay. You can sign up for an online course which takes less than two hours to complete and can be done at your own pace.

January 7, 2021 at 6:30 PM via ZOOM

President Joan Moeschberger welcomed 55 members and reminded everyone that AAUW advances equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. President Joan introduced our Program VP, Donna Cook, who in turn introduced our speaker for the evening, Dr. Jesus Smith. Dr. Smith is an Assistant Professor of Ethnic Studies at Lawrence University in Appleton and spoke to our membership about gender and racism.

President Joan then called the meeting to order. The December minutes were approved as published. Joan explained that our Appleton branch has achieved 5 Star status at the national level. The 5 areas of focus are Programs, Advancement, Communications and External Relations, Public Policy and Research, and Governance and Sustainability. Members were encouraged to participate in AAUW National's art contest.

Program VP Donna Cook reviewed our December virtual auction results and thanked her committee. She also thanked all members for their participation and donations to help make the auction successful. The next branch meeting will be virtual on Saturday, February 13, 2021, at 9:30 AM. The program will be on Racial Disparity and Police Reform.

Membership VP Georgianne Bravick talked about the New Year's Day virtual gathering of members. She showed pictures of those attending the gathering.

Finance VP Kathleen Gagnow gave the December 2020 financial report. We gave \$2000 (\$1000 each) for 2 scholarships. We received \$5700 from the auction that will go into the Scholarship Fund for 2021. December 2020 expenses were \$265 and were auction related. We received \$125 for the Ellie Olson Memorial Fund.

Past President Becky O'Connor reminded everyone of our *Just Mercy* virtual discussion dates. They are: January 14, at 6:30 PM, January 20, at 2 PM, and January 21, at 1 PM. Zoom links will be sent to all members.

Public Policy Jacqui Klimaszewski discussed a Martin Luther King Day program on January 18, at 6PM. A virtual link was given if members are interested in attending. There will be a primary election on February 16, 2021. Up for election will be the State Superintendent of Schools. A link was given to listen to a recording of the candidate forum. An advisory committee will meet in January 2021 to discuss the possibility of a statue of Vel Phillips, the first black Wisconsin Secretary of State, going up at the Capitol in Madison. Jacqui next talked about a Fair Maps referendum that will be on the April 6th ballot. Helene Iverson's husband is on the Fair Maps committee if anyone has any questions about this. Finally, Jacqui discussed the Influential Women Then and Now essay contest for students in grades 6-8. The deadline to enter is February 26. A website was given for contest details. Jacqui showed our membership some Inspirational words and sayings to help us through these difficult times.

Funds Development chair Mary Grace said we have >\$10,000 in our Scholarship Fund for 2021. We will be giving 2 FVTC scholarships and several university scholarships this year. April 15th is the deadline for submitting a scholarship entry.


