Elaine Siegrist Member since 1953

We are proud and excited to announce that Elaine Siegrist has the distinction of being the first official AAUW Appleton branch member to be highlighted (excluding introductions of new members) in our monthly newsletter! Thank you, Elaine!

Elaine was born in Green Bay, and went to B.S. Fontbonne University in St. Louis, Missouri, then to the University of Iowa, where she served an internship and earned an M.S. in nutrition. She worked and taught as a dietitian at Mercy Hospital in Iowa City, and then at St. Mary's Hospital in Milwaukee.

Elaine and her husband moved to Appleton where he became the second anesthesiologist at St. Elizabeth Hospital. Within a week of living in Appleton, a neighbor invited her to her home for the Annual AAUW Fireside Chat meeting. It was 1953. Elaine recalls that during those early years of AAUW, the book sale was held in the lobby of the Zuelke Building on a few tables!

Elaine and her husband had six children, so she was quite a busy mother, involving herself in Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and many school activities. Today, she is active in a local book club and also an investment club previously through AAUW (but now divested from the Appleton Branch).

Elaine will soon be 95 years old, but that did NOT keep her from being very active pre-COVID in several classes at the local YMCA. She misses everyone so very much!!!

AAUW-Appleton Book Recommendations - Racial Disparities

- Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson: Just Mercy is an unforgettable true account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended, and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit of true justice. Bryan Stevenson founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending the poor, the wrongly condemned, and those trapped in the furthest reaches of our criminal justice system. This book was named one of the best books of the year by The New York Times, The Washington Post, The Boston Globe, Time and Esquire. It also was winner of multiple book awards including the Carnegie Medal for Excellence in non-fiction and the NAACP Image Award for Nonfiction.
- **Evicted** by **Matthew Desmond:** In *Evicted*, sociologist Matthew Desmond follows eight families in Milwaukee as they each struggle to keep a roof over their heads. This book transforms our understanding of poverty and economic exploitation while providing fresh ideas for solving one of America's most devastating problems. *Evicted* is a Pulitzer Prize winner and winner of many other awards. This book was a Fox Cities Reads book in 2019.
- Caste by Isabel Wilkerson: In this brilliant book, Isabel Wilkerson gives us a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings. Wilkerson, who received a Pulitzer Prize for her book *The Warmth of Other Suns*, shows that the insidious undertow of caste is experienced every day. This book is beautifully written, original and revealing.
- How to Be an Antiracist: by Ibram X. Kendi: We are either racist or antiracist, there is nothing in between, argues this powerful memoir and political guide. Kendi's argument is brilliantly simple. An idea, action or policy is either racist that is contributing to a history that regards different races as inherently unequal or it is antiracist, because it is trying to dismantle that history. There is nothing in between. People of all races and backgrounds can fall into either category depending on their ideas, actions or the policies they support.
- Waking Up White by Debby Irving: This book is a non-fiction book about the subject of white privilege. Author Debby Irving reflects on her own experiences of being an American white woman and coming to terms with the complexity of race in the United States. This book is about how race has long mattered in more pervasive ways. With eloquence and a sense of urgency, Irving takes us on a journey into the heart of this American issue.

International Women's Day—March 8, 2021

Equal Pay Day denotes how far into the new year women must work to be paid what men were paid the previous year. Started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996, the goal was to raise awareness about the gender wage gap. Since then, other Equal Pay Days have been added to the calendar to denote that mothers and most women of color face a wider-than-average gap and need to work even longer to catch up to men's earnings.

ALL Women's Equal Pay Day is March 24. American women as a whole are paid 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man who works full time and year round.

AAUW has developed a free program to learn to successfully advocate for yourself – and help close the pay gap for women everywhere. Through Work Smart Online you can research your target salary, highlight your accomplishments and find the right words – and the confidence – to negotiate for better benefits and pay. You can sign up for an online course which takes less than two hours to complete and can be done at your own pace.

Proposed AAUW Bylaws Amendment

AAUW's annual election will start on April 7. Included in the vote is a **proposal to open membership**, which requires a change to AAUW's national bylaws through member vote. A description of the proposed bylaws changes can be found **here**.

HOW MIGHT THIS BYLAW CHANGE AFFECT MY BRANCH?

It will help protect the future of AAUW by opening up opportunities for funding. Because our current educational degree requirement can be deemed discriminatory and not in keeping with our mission, some foundations and corporations will not donate to our organization since it is counter to their criteria of equity. This disadvantage, along with the now 400-plus organizations competing with AAUW on women's equity issues for funding, greatly affects National's ability to get much needed funding. Declining membership, now at 50,000, only provides 15-20% of the annual budget. This is not enough to support branch and member services.

It will make it easier for your branch to recruit a more diverse membership, including those who did not have the opportunity to attend college 30, 40 or 50 years ago. In addition to possibly increasing membership, these new members may bring new energy and viewpoints critical to your branch's ability to meet the needs of your community through our mission. It will also remove the embarrassing situations when you must tell someone they do not qualify, such as a government official, a non-profit leader or even a Tech Trek parent. Remember, Eleanor Roosevelt and Lily Ledbetter would not qualify for AAUW membership with our current educational requirement.

It will update the relevance and image of your branch as the world reckons with inequality and systemic racism, much of which disproportionately affects women. It might open up more opportunities for collaboration. Having a limiting membership requirement can be considered discriminatory and off putting to other local like-minded groups. When speaking at community functions, it demeans the branch to say that not everyone can be a member.

It will no longer limit your membership by penalizing women who cannot attain a degree due to to-day's skyrocketing educational costs, childcare, elder care, transportation, working multiple jobs and language barriers. Today, there are more alternatives to college degrees which have burdened women with two-thirds of the national college debt. With more careers open to women, i.e., firefighters, pilots, entrepreneurs, artists, politicians, manufacturers, retail managers, and more, your branch may have the potential for a variety of new members.

WHAT WON'T CHANGE IF THIS PASSES?

It will not affect AAUW's status as one of the leaders in graduate grants and fellowships. Due to the generosity of our members our fellowships and grants are fully endowed and will continue in perpetuity.

It will not affect the name – AAUW. Like the YWCA and NAACP, much of the original meanings are no longer accurate. For example, we are international, not just American. We have been open to individuals with associate degrees, not just degrees from universities, since 2005 and open to men since 1987.

It will not affect the honor of having earned a degree in times when so few women attained this achievement. Today, with women outpacing men in earning all degrees for decades, we can be proud that we were instrumental in breaking down the barriers for women who followed us.

The "Cities for CEDAW Initiative" is Coming to Appleton!

CEDAW is an international treaty approved by the United Nations: Convention to Eliminate All Forms of Discrimination Against Women—the most comprehensive international agreement addressing women's rights withing political, civil, cultural, economic, and social life. This is also knows as the International Bill of Rights for Women. Check out this website for more information: http://worldwithoutgenocide.org/toolkits/cedaw.

CEDAW is celebrating is 40th anniversary this year. This treaty was signed by Jimmy Carter on July 17, 1980—however, *it has still NOT been ratified for the US by our legislators!!* This treaty has been signed and ratified by 189 States Parties—but not the United States. Other governments that have **not ratified** the treaty include Iran, Palau, Somalia, Sudan, and Tonga.

Two hundred international and national organizations have already indicated their support for CEDAW including American Association of University Women—and AAUW Appleton Branch as well as the Appleton Mid-day Women's Alliance.

Cities for CEDAW will have a virtual public meeting to educate people on CEDAW on Convention on **Tuesday, March 23, 2021 at 7:00-8:30 pm CST**. The goal is to have Appleton passing a resolution in support of the Convention/ International Bill of Rights for Women. A registration link will be sent out via MailChimp in March—look for it!





February 13, 2021 at 9:30 AM via ZOOM

President Joan Moeschberger welcomed everyone and reminded members that AAUW advances equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. President Joan introduced Jacqui Klimaszewski, the program moderator for the evening, who introduced our speaker, Jim Steineke (R-Kaukauna) who spoke to our members on the Wisconsin Task Force on Racial Disparities.

President Joan then called the meeting to order. She thanked Jacqui Klimaszewski, Carol Lenz, Donna Cook, and Judy Goodnight for their help with this month's program. The January minutes were approved as published. President Joan then reminded everyone that this Spring there will be a vote at the National level concerning the elimination of the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. Program VP Donna Cook reminded members of our upcoming branch meetings in March and April. March 16th at 6:30 PM will be our essay contest winners' presentation. April 8th at 6:30 PM is a presentation by Carlene Bechen on fair maps and gerrymandering.

Membership VP Georgianne Bravick talked about our recent Valentine Zippy Zoom social on February 9th. She showed pictures of the 20 members in attendance and said there was a lively discussion at the meeting about getting COVID vaccines.

AAUW Reads Becky O'Connor thanked all participants for attending the *Just Mercy* discussions. The next AAUW Appleton Reads book will be *The Woman's Hour* by Elaine Weiss. Author Weiss will be the speaker at the August 26th Women's Equality Day event.

Public Policy Jacqui Klimaszewski reported that our Branch gave a \$100 donation to the Equal Justice Initiative to further the work of Bryan Stevenson, author of *Just Mercy*. Jacqui talked about the upcoming election for State Superintendent of Schools, with the winners of the election on February 16th going on the April 6th ballot. A fair maps resolution, local school board, local municipal offices and State Circuit Court will be on the April 6th ballot. For the March essay contest, Jacqui has received some entries. The deadline for entries is February 26th.
