

Gloria L. Blackwell Named New AAUW Chief Executive Officer



Gloria, in addition to her role as CEO, is also AAUW's main representative to the United Nations. Among her many accomplishments is her 15-year management of AAUW's highly esteemed fellowships and grants program—awarding more than \$70 million in funding to women scholars and programs in the U.S. and overseas.

Gloria has also been the driving force behind AAUW's signature programs, including its salary negotiation trainings, which have reached nearly 190,000 nationwide. She has worked on pay eq-

uity initiatives with public officials in Washington D.C., New York City, Boston and Pittsburgh, as well as with numerous other state and municipal partners. She also worked with the National Science Foundation to increase girls participation in the science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields. Most notably, Gloria has significantly expanded the AAU-W's outreach to girls and women of color.

Before joining AAUW in 2004 she was the director of Africa education programs at the Institute of International Education (IIE). She also managed fellowships programs during her decade at IIE and has held positions as a Peace Corps staff member and volunteer in Africa. She holds a master's degree in education and human development from the George Washington University, a bachelor's degree in international affairs from the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University, and studied at the American University in Paris. Gloria is committed to supporting opportunities and empowerment for women and girls globally.



Public Policy Updates

Urge Senate Action to Protect Voting Rights

Minority women are most targeted by the actions being taken to limit voting privileges. As a group of WI women, I believe we need to actively advocate for voting rights for all people and an end to barriers to participation. This is a press release from the State of Wisconsin Governor's office:

Gov. Evers, Sixteen Governors Urge Senate Action to Protect Voting Rights

MADISON — Gov. Tony Evers today, together with 16 other governors, sent a letter to U.S. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer and U.S. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell expressing concern over threats to the nation's democracy and calling for action on federal legislation to protect voting rights and the right of every eligible voter to cast their ballot.

The letter specifically calls for the U.S. Senate to pass the Freedom to Vote Act and the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, two federal bills that would ensure fairness in our elections, end partisan gerrymandering, modernize voter registration, and fight back against voter suppression efforts in Wisconsin and across the country.

"Working to ensure every eligible voter has the right to cast their ballot shouldn't be a partisan or political issue—it's a fundamental part of our democracy and ensuring we continue to have free, safe, and secure elections," said Gov. Evers. "Hundreds of bills have been introduced in states across our country by politicians trying to abuse their power to overturn or predetermine election results. Federal action is needed now more than ever to strengthen our democracy and ensure folks who are eligible to vote have free and fair access to the ballot box."

The governors' letter comes as states across the country are seeing elected officials abuse their power to make it harder for eligible voters to cast their ballots, attack election administrators and workers, and undermine election laws. In Wisconsin, Legislative Republicans have signaled they may pursue efforts to take over election administration after rewriting the laws only a few years ago, have attacked and disparaged election administrators, and have spread disinformation about the November 2020 election.

Earlier this year, Gov. Evers <u>vetoed</u> a set of legislation passed by Republicans in the Legislature that would have added unnecessary hurdles for eligible voters to cast their ballots, including specific provisions that would have made it more difficult for older voters and voters with disabilities to participate in elections. The legislation vetoed by the governor also included bills that would have limited absentee voting and restricted local officials' ability to administer elections. Additionally, after Republicans in the Legislature last month passed legislative and congressional maps that the governor slammed as "<u>gerrymandering</u> <u>2.0</u>" and that received <u>"F" ratings</u> from the Princeton Gerrymandering Project, Gov. Evers fulfilled his promise to veto gerrymandered maps sent to his desk. [Continued on next page]

The Freedom to Vote Act would:

- Stop gerrymandered election maps;
- Support continued election transparency;
- Push back against new voter suppression laws;
- Protect local election officials and poll workers from partisan attacks and harassment; and
- Establish standards for post-election audits.

The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act would:

- Restore the protections of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the federal government's ability to respond to discrimination at the polls;
- Update federal law in the wake of the Supreme Court decision in Shelby v. Holder;
- Modernize the formula used to determine where there are patterns of discrimination;
- Ensure last-minute changes to voting do not adversely affect voters; and
- Strengthen the federal government's ability to send federal observers to jurisdictions where elections are facing threats of discrimination.

A copy of the governor's letter can be found <u>here</u>. The letter is jointly signed by 17 governors from Wisconsin, Michigan, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois, Minnesota, North Carolina, New Jersey, New Mexico, Nevada, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, and Washington.




