"This moment marks another major step forward for women, and the American Association of University Women is proud to have been part of that progress. Over the course of our 140-year history, our activism and advocacy have contributed to the achievement of many firsts." – AAUW Chief Executive Officer Gloria Blackwell on the confirmation by the U.S. Senate of Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson to the U.S. Supreme Court.

It's hard to imagine, but when AAUW was founded, many "firsts" had not happened. There was no Coca-Cola, no paper clip, no sliced bread, and no zipper. AAUW began before the Times Square Ball drop, the Winter Olympic games, and talking-picture movies. When a group of women decided it was time to advocate for education and equity for women in 1881, there were no Girl Scouts, no Coast Guard enlistees, no National Park Service workers. There was no right to vote for women.

Sometime when you have a moment, check out the AAUW timeline on the national page (be sure to create your new login at the same time!) and take a moment to appreciate being part of an organization that has such a history of firsts. Member Frances Perkins, for one. In 1933 she became the first U.S. Cabinet Secretary and became an "integral part of many New Deal initiatives." In 1938 AAUW published *The Living Wage for College Women*, documenting widespread sex discrimination in academia. In 1945 AAUW actively advocated for the creation of the United Nations. In 1968 they founded the Coretta Scott King Fund. In 1969 AAUW urged branch members to study environmental problems in their communities. Gloria Blackwell: "We stood strong when Sandra Day O'Connor became the first woman Supreme Court Justice" and "when Kamala Harris was elected vice-president. These women's accomplishments may now seem commonplace, but we must never forget the hard work and sacrifice it took to break new ground."

It is no wonder that AAUW is so proud of Judge Jackson's confirmation by the U.S. Senate. As the first black woman on the court, we know we can celebrate yet one more nick on that timeline. And maybe in some small way, we helped. Just a bit. By sending in our dues, by joining a discussion, by attending a meeting, by accepting a leadership role. Just a bit...but all adding up to making a difference.

Time to learn more about this very active AAUW member:

I was raised on a dairy farm in Northeastern Wisconsin--a great way to be brought up, but with not a lot of money. Luckily, at that time, the State of Wisconsin invested in their young people and I was able to attend college on state grants and scholarships. At UW Oshkosh I earned a degree in Secondary Education (English & Social Studies), a Master's Degree in Reading Education , and eventually certification to be a Curriculum Coordinator.

I was a Title I Reading Teacher in Omro, Wisconsin, working with students struggling in reading and math from Pre-School through 6th grade, From there I taught a high school Freshman Reading class to provide those students with a leg-up on high school English courses. I also was the District Curriculum (K-12) Coordinator before moving on the being a field consultant for the School Evaluation Consortium/North Central Association (school accreditation) and traveled throughout the state working with public and private schools on school improvement processes.

In 1993 I started as the Appleton Area School District as a Curriculum Coordinator and went through various iterations of that title, retiring as the Humanities Coordinator. In all the curriculum coordinator positions I had responsibility for the administration and evaluation of Title IX. Currently I am an ad hoc professor at Concordia teaching reading and education courses.

I married Jim in 1971--he was also an educator and we met at UW-O. We have two cats (Lady and Tramp) and hope to be getting back to some traveling soon.

I have been an AAUW member since 2007 after retiring from Appleton Area School District. Stephanie Malaney brought me to the Holiday Brunch. I have been Asst. Vice President of Program, VP of Program, President, and co-chair of the STEM committee and chair of the Public Policy Committee. Being part of leadership really helps you get to know and work with a variety of wonderful women on matters that are important to improving the opportunities for women and girls. Having the honor of being the branch president during the 2013 Centennial year for our branch is certainly memorable. It was great to work with all the members who worked on the celebration (organizing and adding their creativity) and fascinating to hear about and meet former members.

Equity and equal access have always been integral to all my work and endeavors--I think it's that Quaker strand that runs through my lineage. Eleanor Roosevelt has always impressed me. She went forward pushing others to do the right thing in a time when there was great pressure and prejudice not to. She was an activist who influenced individuals, the nation and the world--from youth organizations to the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights. She is the embodiment of my passion for equity.

Although much of my time is taken up with work with AAUW, League of Women Voters and Literacy organizations, I enjoy reading, jigsaw &word puzzles, and gardening.






