




## Save the date for our all-day STEM conference for girls in grades 6-9 on Saturday, March 11, 2023, at UWO Fox Cities in Menasha.







He heard a soundtrack for his future in the steady click of hard sole shoes Out in the hall A guy friend of mine told me this one time About the curious straightening of his spine At hearing the stride of a grown man's shoes Disembodied from any particular man in motion The audio metered his path His young imagination was empty of specific plans He just knew that his shoes would echo with purpose One day, even his steps would strike and snap firm surfaces Clacking cadence from the hallway, ballroom Sanctuary, aisles and stage

I can still recall the slow fade of his expectant smile When he asked if I felt the same about high heeled shoes

Umm, no. Well, maybe.

I heard the hallways in a different key The click of their heels trained my young ears to hear Confidence and Counterfeit Feminine and Felonious Leadership and Lonely Mission-driven and Mean The sound of heels is expected Women are expected Not to be expected

He dreamed of walking atop linoleum, marble and wood My inclination was to raise my heels Just a little Quiet my approach Just a little Lighten my impression and my own load Measure my stomp against my sashay I worried about toppling

I first heard my steps fill a hallway with echoes With my eyes trained up, ahead of me Not focused on my feet, or anyone else's I learned to read the music Of women in motion Of women taking steps, making moves Tapping, stomping, scampering, sometimes Fan kicking, twirling and gliding backwards Studying women's rhythms helped me better score my own When we make it to the hallway Our steps might click clack show tunes, hymnals, trap rap and the blues I learned to move swiftly in 4:4 time From watching you I learned to center my weight on the point of a high heel From watching you From you and you, I remember to position my feet into a T for pictures On the days that pinch and ache I watched you keep moving Do not take off the shoes, you said Toppling is just another two-step Who's out there in the hallway

Walking all loud All hard All steady All unbothered Who's that woman making noise out there in the hall like she's supposed to be broadcasting big band sounds On the ways women have to --get to- move around

Thank you for gliding, stomping, skipping, sliding Leading our dance in all the ways YOU move As authentically you Serenading power to the next set of shoes making theme music Out in the hall

Dasha Kelly Hamilton is a writer, performance artist, curator, and facilitator. Ultimately, she's a creative change agent, leveraging the creative process toward human and social wellness.

Her nonprofit, Still Waters Collective, initiated literary arts programming for 20 years, creating platforms for thousands of voices to be honored and heard.
