Women Pulling at The Threads of Social Discourse



If you surveyed the 12 of us who traveled to the museum, you would probably get 12 different answers as to which piece of art was their favorite. I decided to highlight this piece, *Life in Limbo* by Wisconsin artist Judy Zoelzer Levine for you. Quilting, spinning, weaving, knitting, crocheting, sewing, stitchery—primarily done by women—have been diminished in the cultural setting to that of a craft, not a piece of art. Yet these women produce not only amazing artwork but also provide provoking statements about our society, the problems we face, and the effects of these problems and cultural prejudices on women's lives. In the work above, Ms. Levine portrays many figures—women, men, children, who represent the 272 million international migrants globally. At the bottom of the fabric piece, she has handstitched reasons that cause people to leave their homes to seek a safer, better life for themselves and their families such as famine, drought, war, persecution, & dictatorship. We were all moved by the exhibit which continues through December 31st. I encourage you to visit on your own. -Judy Goodnight
