Dear Friends,

STEM NEWS

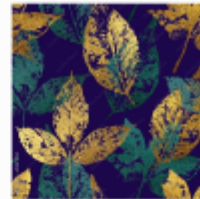
As was noted in the August 2024 Newsletter, Fox Valley Technical College and Junior Achievement have expressed an interest in partnering with AAUW for their STEM focused events. Here is more information on future opportunities:

- ♦ Junior Achievement gives elementary, middle, and high school students relevant, hands-on experiences and skills in financial literacy, work readiness and entrepreneurship. There are a number of volunteer opportunities with JA, including their Capstone Program that is offered at the Capstone Center in Appleton. One of the programs offered is JA BizTown that combines teacher-led class learning with a day-long visit to a simulated town and is for fourth/fifth grade students. Kristine Kolb, Education Manager for JA of Wisconsin believes that AAUW members with our expertise and experience would be great volunteers for this program. If interested in a tour of the Capstone Center, let me know. More information with the date/times of the JA Biztown will be provided soon.
- ♦ FVTC is offering a TechKnowledge event on November 5, 2024. It is a career exploration day that allows middle school students to visit campus and go through different hands-on experiences or presentations related to different career areas. According to Amanda Martzahl, Career Discovery & K12 Partnership Specialist, these sessions last about 30 minutes before students move on to the next. This event could be a great opportunity for AAUW volunteers to provide more meaningful interaction with students and share their experiences and expertise. Voices of AAUW History:

This summer Judy Goodnight, our historian, and I took a look at the tubs and boxes of minutes, newspaper clippings, yearbooks, and records of our branch which are growing each year, taking a great deal of storage space in her home. Thank you, Judy!

The very earliest of our records are kept in the Lawrence University archives, and we will add to what is held there with our findings from the 1930s through 1960s. Our branch was founded by Emma Kate Corkhill, a faculty member at Lawrence, in April of 1913, so Lawrence has graciously given us space in their archives.

Amongst our findings were two books: one a history of AAUW written in 1931 by our national founder, Marion Talbot, the other a much slimmer volume titled, What Is Worthwhile? written (and delivered as a speech) by Anna Robertson Brown, Ph.D. in 1893. Those books will be included in the archives but I thought you might find a few quotes from them as interesting as I did.

from The History of AAUW:

describing Marion Talbot's graduation from college, " Her friends, who looked forward to marriage as the only possible step after finishing school and the formal debut, did not speak the same language as this young graduate of 1880. This unusual course (graduating college) had resulted in what was almost total social ostracism for the young graduate, who had by her college course cut herself off from her girlhood friends. No 'Junior League' or "Sewing Circle' or 'Vincent Club' of those days wanted as a member a young woman whose aims were so different than their own, and whose time was absorbed by what was to them a hopeless tangle of tormenting questions whose solution got one nowhere socially when it was all over."

From what I read, loneliness was as big a factor in forming the Association of College Alumnae as intellectual needs. Marion Talbot's mother was so concerned by her daughter's social isolation that she proposed an organization of college graduates who could meet to discuss, learn, share, and find friendly acceptance. It was touching to read of the relief and joy those first members felt as they accepted the call to come together to form this new group. Seventeen women representing 8 colleges gathered in November, 1881, at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The University of Wisconsin was represented by Maria M Dean and Alma F Frisby!

and then we have Dr. Brown's What is Worth While?

" Shall we miss all the divine sweetness of life in order to have a career? Not all college-bred women think how that sounds when, led by no pressure of bread-winning which impels them to seek higher advantages, but simply by an absorbing ambition, they leave their father or mother, or both, in a lonely home... Little by little that intellectual ambition will draw us away, if we are not careful, from our true place in life, and will make cold, unloved, and unhelpful women of us, instead of the joyous, affectionate, and unselfish women we might have been. A woman who forgets this, even in the course of a most brilliant career otherwise, the world will forget to love her; it will scorn her, and justly."
