Hello Friends,

It's not just you. Studies in the late 1970s showed that girls, much more than boys, blame themselves for failures or disappointments. You got a B? You must not have studied enough, or be smart enough. The cute boy you had your eye on started dating someone else? You weren't pretty enough. Your friend didn't call? You must have said something wrong.

You may remember that those same studies, some funded by AAUW, reported that boys tended to blame outside causes for their shortcomings. The teacher was bad, the girl was uppity, that subject is dumb anyway.

Of course studies only show trends, and don't account for individual experiences. Perhaps you were as confident as the boys you attended school with. Perhaps you shrugged off coming up short casually. Good for you, or perhaps more accurately, good for your parents, but most of us assumed blame for disappointments as a default setting. And many of us still limit ourselves because of that burden.

Which brings me to how much I'm looking forward to having a president elect as of July 1. I've mentored new teachers, but never new leaders, and I think it would be exciting to share what I have figured out, look at future possibilities, and work towards that person taking over and me taking a seat so I can applaud. Here's a secret: most of what happens here in AAUW Appleton isn't due to the president, it's all those dedicated leaders of our many moving parts. Presidents are cheerleaders, maybe marketers, but mostly they keep an eye on everything that everyone else is busy accomplishing. And then celebrate their successes.

You may be thinking that you could never do it. You could. You'd have a year to learn. To figure out your own take on leadership. You might want a co-president; we can do that. You might want help from most everyone; we do that. Believe me, in our branch, everywhere you turn there's someone who is ready to help.

Chris Taylor is our nominating chair, and she takes phone calls and emails, and so do I. Please consider offering your time and talent for any of the elected positions. I can say I've gotten more than I've given. We have a healthy branch, but we always need new leaders to maintain that. You could do it. You're good enough. And we need you!

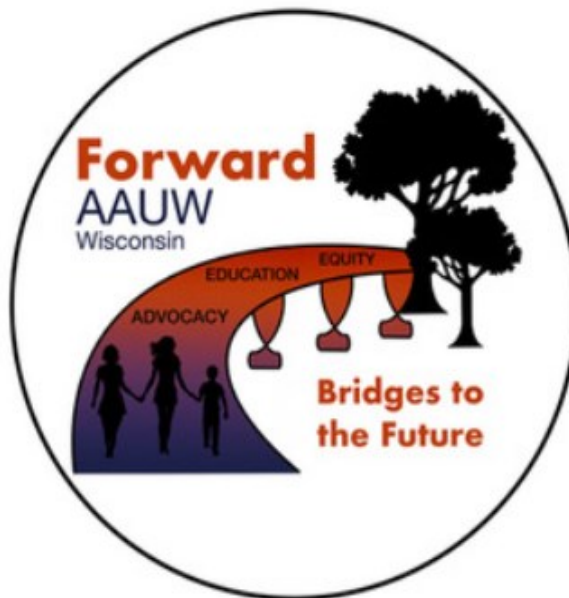




AAUW Appleton Public Policy

Our branch will be watching for updates and action alerts from both AAUW-WI and from National in the coming months. We will also continue our focus on Public Education. Please take a moment to look over these updates from your public policy committee.

 You received an email from Shannon Wolfe at AAUW National. There is an opportunity for you to give your feedback on proposed changes in Public Policy Priorities. Your voice is very important and will help National guide their actions for a member vote in spring. **Recently you received an AAUW Action Network alert from Meghan Kissell. Be sure to make your voice heard with this EASY ACTION you can take. AAUW opposes Linda McMahon's nomination for the next Secretary of the U.S. Department of Education. You can join AAUW in taking action to protect public education and students' civil rights. McMahon has "no significant background in education, school administration, or civil rights protections." She "supports using public funds for private schools." She "supports the elimination of robust Title IX protections."**

 Be watching for information about important elections! There will be a Spring Primary on February 18th and a General Spring Election on April 1. Our State Supreme Court will elect a new justice (a non-partisan position) so AAUW will be paying close attention to the issues endorsed by both candidates.

 Be sure to LIKE and FOLLOW **Fox Cities Advocates for Public Education** on Facebook. You can also check out the **Wisconsin Public Education Network (WPEN)** website for a wealth of information on issues relating to public education. Being informed and having the facts when discussing these topics with our friends and families can make a difference.

 The next time our AAUW-Appleton Public Policy Committee meets, we will discuss the possibility of reviving the Equal Pay Day activity that our branch members did in the past and/or initiating a new action. Although we are waiting for National to announce *all* the 2025 Equal Pay Days which are published and "used to raise awareness around and combat pay inequities", the *All Women's Equal Pay Day is **March 25***. In the past, we handed out Pay Day candy bars at an area college with information about all the significant dates (including Black Women's EPD, Asian American EPD, Latina EPD, Native Women's EPD and others.)

PUBLIC EDUCATION UPDATE—Carol Lenz

Feb 18 - Nonpartisan Primary Election

Because there are three candidates running for Superintendent of Public Instruction there will be a primary election. Learn about the candidates [HERE](#) so you can make an informed choice. Some local municipality and school board elections may also require a primary. The general election is on April 1. FYI - If you prefer to vote by mail, you should request an absentee ballot NOW at myvote.wi.gov. Your request must be renewed annually.

February 18 - Budget Address

Governor Evers will introduce his budget during the Biennial Budget Address on February 19 at 7 p.m. The Governor's budget is based on department requests and input from the listening sessions that were held in December. Included is a proposal to allow Wisconsinites to enact statutory and constitutional changes through a majority vote at the ballot box and without the Legislature's approval. Twenty six states already allow citizen ballot initiatives. Read the details [HERE](#).

Decoupling??

There is a push to decouple the voucher tax from the school property tax. Although property taxes would decrease, the cost of private school funding will be hidden elsewhere. Voucher costs would come out of General Purpose Revenue first and whatever is left goes to other programs. Decoupling decreases transparency and accountability which is the exact opposite of what is needed when public money is being spent. And, it does nothing to increase public school funding.

If you attended the November Branch Meeting, you had the opportunity to hear Kristine Kolb from Junior Achievement give an overview of their organization and the volunteer opportunities available. Our March Branch meeting will be held at the JA Center and will include a short tour. I hope you will be able to attend and see for yourself what a great organization JA is.

JA Volunteer Opportunities for AAUW

1. Traditional Classroom Volunteer Program Overview

Volunteers are partnered with a teacher and grade their choice to deliver five 30/45-minute lessons. The schedule is flexible, spanning 5, 4, 3 weeks, etc., to suit both the volunteer and teacher. These JA Programs are conducted in the fall or spring semester, as per the teacher's request. The teacher remains present to aid in classroom management. Our JA program kits include all necessary materials and a user-friendly guide with engaging activities. Volunteers receive an in-person or virtual training session to prepare for their specific JA program.

Here are some of the school districts who need volunteers ...

Neenah, Menasha, Oshkosh, Fond du lac, Appleton, Kimberly, Kaukauna, Little Chute, and Freedom.

Volunteer opportunities include grades K-8th and some High Schools.

2. Volunteer Opportunities for our Experiential Learning Center at the Junior Achievement offices in Appleton.

JA BizTown combines teacher-led in-class learning with a day-long visit to our simulated town.

For Fourth/Fifth grade students

The volunteer commitment for this program is one day approximately 8:30 am - 2:00 pm

Allows elementary school students to operate banks, work in businesses, manage restaurants, write checks, and vote for mayor. Students can connect the dots between what they learn in school and the real world.

JA Finance Park is for personal financial planning and career exploration. This program, comprising a curriculum and a simulation, helps students build a foundation on which they can make intelligent financial decisions that last a lifetime. • For Sixth, seventh and eighth graders.

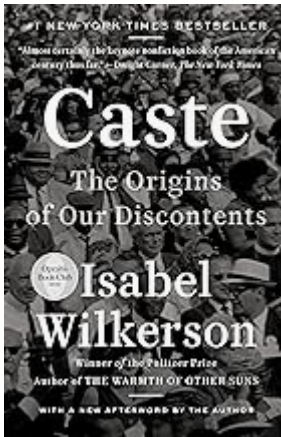

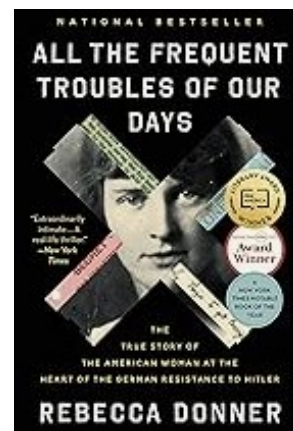
EVENING LITERATURE BOOK GROUP
