President's Page

Hello Friends,

Do you think money grows on trees? My dad often reacted with that question as my mom would mention her hopes for home improvements, an opportunity for one of us kids, or anything outside our normal expenditures. This was often at the dinner table, with our parents at opposite ends of the table (and viewpoints) and the 5 of us chewing and pivoting to follow the discussion lob back and forth. It didn't take me too long to realize that while Mom never ruined the meal with arguing, she quietly went about getting most of what she wanted/needed eventually. And mysteriously, Dad didn't seem to object.

It took me longer to realize that it was timing that made the difference. Dad owned a farm implement business, so his income was uneven. The periods when income didn't quite meet expenses were when he was quick with the veto, and my mother quick to retreat despite believing the projects she had in mind were sensible and needed. When you're in survival mode you aren't interested in long-term thinking or achieving goals, no matter how worthwhile, and my mother understood and accepted that.

We've received news that national AAUW will probably implement a dues increase over the next several years. Our first instinct is quite similar to my dad's old question. Aren't we already paying a lot? What do they do, anyway? Where's the value? Do they think money grows on trees?

I hope none of us is in survival mode personally, and that after some cooling off time we can pause and consider. We will remember the value we receive from national: the leadership, the research, the advocacy, and the assistance. Our own branch comes to mind with the varied opportunities for growth, learning, and achieving important goals through our scholarships and our public policy involvement. Our friendships are priceless. We are each better for our involvement.

And then there's inflation. Each trip to the grocery store renews that pain, and not just in the egg department. We know expenses for everything have risen, so that doing more with less, more with smaller staff has become the necessity that every organization lives with. The past few years for national AAUW has meant cutting budgets and payrolls. Reluctantly we face reality and understand the need for an incremental raise now. And like my dad, we may not notice the \$5 a year increase.

I want my voice heard on Capitol Hill. I want to have facts to back up opinions. I want to speak up for women and girls' opportunities and fairness. I want to help prosecute sexual harassment in the workplace. I want Title IX to be the law everywhere and for everyone. I want women to do better at achieving pay equity. I don't want books being pulled from library shelves because they make someone uncomfortable . I don't have time or power to do all that, but AAUW stands up for those worthy goals with my support. My membership makes me part of the change I desire.

Mom quietly shaped our future by funding our needs. She saw the expenditures as investments in our future achievement. Today we're being asked to ensure the future of the organization that gives us purpose and achievement. Let's keep our eyes on the goals we share.

But please watch for those that come from **Meghan Kissell.** These will have timely actions that directly relate to AAUW core issues. You can join this nationwide ACTION NET-WORK in "urging Congress to improve and expand legislation protecting equity in education, economic security and civil rights."

Looking for an easy way to contact your legislators? You can download the free app **5 Calls** to find phone numbers and sample scripts to help you with your messages. You can target issues that are central to AAUW and make your voice heard.

The following is an excerpt from a recent press release on the day that McMahon became the Secretary of Education. You can read the full position taken by AAUW on the national website.

"The Secretary of Education should be focused on strengthening civil rights protections, not undermining them," said Gloria L. Blackwell, CEO of AAUW. "McMahon's support for private school vouchers would strip critical federal funding from public schools, her failure to commit to the SAVE student loan repayment plan threatens to saddle millions of borrowers with a lifetime of debt, and her disregard for the vital work of the Office for Civil Rights puts the safety and well-being of student survivors of gender-based harassment, discrimination, and violence at risk."

High-quality education is the foundation of a democratic society and the key to economic prosperity, college and career readiness, and gender equality. The U.S. Department of Education plays a critical role in ensuring opportunity for all through enforcement of federal civil rights laws, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, Title IX of the Education Amendments Act, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

Our March Equal Pay Day event has been put on hold for a year. But you can still spread the word about this important issue for AAUW! Equal Pay Day 2025 is March 25 and marks the current state of the gender pay gap for women. A future newsletter will mark the complete Equal Pay Day calendar to raise awareness about how the pay gap varies significantly among different communities, particularly for women of color.

PUBLIC EDUCATION UPDATE—Carol Lenz

Celebrate 'Public Schools Week' February 24-28

Take time to thank those who are dedicated to servicing all kids. Spread the good news that happens every day in our public schools. Contact your state representatives and express your support for increasing funding for special education and mental health.

'The Year of the Kid'

The Governor's proposed budget includes record investments in universities and tech colleges, K-12 schools, mental health, literacy, and special education (60%). The budget process is now moving to the Joint Finance Committee. They will the Governor's proposal altogether and start from a zero budget. From this point on, regularly contact your State Senator, Assembly Rep, and Governor Evers. The greatest needs are to raise the special education reimbursement rate (to 60%), drastically increase mental health funding (\$300m), and raise the revenue limit for low spending districts. If a new budget is not passed by **July 1**, the state continues operating under the previous budget.



April 1 Election

Electing a pro-public education State Superintendent of PUBLIC Education is vital. Mail in your ballot early, take advantage of early in-person voting starting March 18, or be sure to get to the polls on April 1. Check out these articles before you vote. Choose wisely. ACTION ALERT: U.S. Department of Education Update

Federal funding makes up approximately 8-10% of a K-12 school district's budget. It would be devasting if federal funding is eliminated or reduced, especially since state funding has not kept up with inflation for the past 16 years. K-12 federal funding mostly supports low poverty schools and special needs students. The <u>Department of Education</u> also enforces civil rights laws in education and recently released a <u>letter</u> threatening schools with a loss of federal funding for failure to comply.

PUBLIC EDUCATION UPDATE CONTINUED...

The U.S. Department of Education was established by Congress. The <u>laws</u> it enforces were passed by Congress and signed into law. The funding was appropriated by Congress. The Executive's responsibility is to faithfully execute the laws. Call your U.S. Senators and Representatives and tell them to ensure the laws and court orders are followed. Remind them that 85% of Wisconsin students are educated in public schools and are counting on their support. Also, call Governor Evers and Attorney General Josh Kaul asking them to take whatever steps are necessary to ensure that federal funding continues.
