#### **AAUW Appleton Public Policy**

While many regular activities take a breather in summer, the issues at the core of AAUW do not. In fact, there are many ways to keep informed and keep active in the upcoming weeks!

Here are some highlights and ways to continue to make a difference!

On June 12, AAUW National encouraged all to take part in an **AAUW Day of Action**. IT IS NOT TOO LATE TO MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD! The U.S House of Representatives passed a budget reconciliation bill that now heads to the Senate, where only a simple majority is needed for passage. With Senate leaders pushing for a vote by the July 4 recess, engagement by AAUW members is essential over the next few weeks. Together, we will urge senators to reject the budget reconciliation bill, which threatens the principles we value: educational access, reproductive health care and economic security.

Follow the articles about Public Education by our own Carol Lenz that are submitted to our newsletter. The information is timely and informative and gives us the tools needed for advocacy. IT IS NOT TOO LATE TO MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD! You can follow Fox Cities Advocates for Public Education on Facebook as well.

### PUBLIC EDUCATION BUDGET UPDATE: Carol Lenz NOT GOOD NEWS!

The Wisconsin Biennial Budget is **THE most important** and impactful legislation that will be signed into law over the next two years. It affects almost every aspect of Wisconsin life.

After talks between Governor Evers and Republican leaders stalled, the Joint Finance Committee passed its own budget, along party lines, that cut more than \$3.1 billion from the amount Evers had allocated for public schools. Across the state, public school leaders, parents, and advocates begged for at least an increase in the special education reimbursement rate from 33% to 60%. **The JFC approved a special education reimbursement rate of 35% for the first year of the budget and 37.5% for the second year.** This is far below what is needed. Also, keep in mind that the special ed private school voucher is funded at 90%. And we still have a \$4.6 billion budget surplus.

Sadly, this meager increase for special education is basically all the increase passed for public education. No increase for low revenue districts. No increase for mental health. No increase for English Learners. No increase for anything. They did pass an increase for vouchers; an additional \$135/student in year one and \$128/student in year two.

#### **NOW WHAT?**

The budget bill now moves on to the state Senate and Assembly, where both houses will have the opportunity to change it substantially, including increasing funding for public schools. There is still time for you to contact your state <u>senator and representative</u> about the budget bill.

Upon passage, the Legislature will deliver the budget bill to Governor Evers to sign, veto, or partially veto. Contact Governor Evers and tell him to be tough. Enough is enough!

If the 2025-27 Biennial Budget is not passed by the end of June, the funding levels of the previous budget remain in effect.



### **AAUW Reads**



Our next book has been chosen! The AAUW Reads book for 2025-26 is a recommendation from the AAUW-Appleton Social Justice group. The topic is timely: immigration.

From Kirkus Reviews: A *New Yorker* staff writer examines the tragedy of Central America against the backdrop of U.S immigration policy. From the beginning, the U.S. has meddled in the affairs of Central America's nations, some of them autocracies. This tinkering, particularly in the Reagan years, led to murder, civil war, and, decades later, a stream of migrants desperate to flee rampant poverty and violence. "For more than a century, the U.S. has devised one policy after another to keep people out of the country," writes Blitzer. "For more than a century, it has failed." It's a sorrowful yet urgent topic, and Blitzer navigates it with both journalistic rigor and compassion. A sobering, well-reported history in which no one emerges a winner.

As always, AAUW Reads tackles difficult topics with heartfelt enthusiasm and courageous discussions. We hope you consider taking part in this one! We will read the book in "chunks" with a schedule that runs from November-April (no discussion in December). Two options each month will be offered...in person and on Zoom. 



#### **TODAY**


