### Hello Friends,

Recently I was browsing the AAUW National website. I had a desire to leave the 21st century for a bit, so I looked at the history section. It seems pretty amusing now, but our first research's purpose was to refute the widely accepted belief that education beyond grade school was detrimental to the reproductive health of women. I can hear it, the "facts" laid out clearly: "A woman has one duty: to make a happy home for her family. There's no need for fanciful tales or ruining her eyesight with all that reading."

After a bit of that, I thought about beliefs we hear today that may seem laughable years from now. I took a look at <u>Project 2025</u>, written by the Heritage Foundation, which has been sited as the base and framework for government this presidential term. This starts with deleting the terms sexual orientation and gender identity, diversity, equity, and inclusion, gender, gender equality, gender equity, gender awareness, gender-sensitive, abortion, reproductive health, reproductive rights, and any other term used to deprive Americans of their First Amendment rights out of every federal rule, agency regulation, contract, grant, regulation, and piece of legislation that exists." p. 4-5

These statements are accepted by many as truth. I'm not laughing. How about you?

My goal for next July Fourth is to be a mother/grandmother/citizen who spoke truth to power so that the beautiful words of defiance that began our country live on. I hope you will join me.

# AAUW State Convention Wrap-Up—Faye Binsfeld

# What A Convention!

Fifteen members of our branch attended the AAUW-WI convention in LaCrosse and we are all in agreement that it was well worth the drive and the time spent there. Here are a few reasons why we all were smiling, and thinking, on the way home:

\*Just sitting at lunch became a learning opportunity with people from other branches eager to tell of successes and look for help with challenges. Conversations were great!

\*Matt Glowacki has turned his birth without legs into a life of motivating others, getting them to understand the intersections of mental health, disability, and care-giving. "Diversity is being invited to the party. Inclusion is being asked to dance. Equity is being the DJ." Inspiration and Insight throughout his talk.

\*Meghan Kissell from National AAUW urged us to stand up and speak out about issues we stand for. We can make a difference through nonpolitical advocacy in the areas of funding education, removing barriers in education and the workplace. As AAUW members, we can support full enforcement of Title IX and other civil rights laws that are under attack currently. But we must always careful to not pair our AAUW membership with any political race. Stick to the issues, but advocate!

\*Information was abundant! Public Policy gave many fact sheets that will be useful as we plan programs and advocate for education. Breakout sessions were interesting and pertinent to our goals.

\*Sarah McBride, the articulate House of Representatives member from Delaware, gave a video greeting that was warm, complimentary about AAUW, and reassuring that as challenging as these times are, our country has seen worse. She reminded us that enslaved people would never have dreamed of an Emancipation Proclamation, that unemployed workers in the 1920s had never heard of a New Deal, and that we are at a "slingshot moment" today. We've been pulled backwards, but like the arc of the moral universe, we will bend toward justice. Rep. McBride is the first openly transgender person to be elected to Congress.

\*We ended the convention with an outstanding program by Amanda Garcia Goodenough, a passionate advocate for the gifts and power diversity brings us. We loved her description of the spaces we need for life: first our family, friends, then our work, then hopefully some public space where we gather for enjoyment, activity, building community. But she thinks what many are missing is a Fourth Space where we have meaningful conversations that are deeper than casual chats. "We cannot heal if we cannot discuss." Many of us realized that AAUW gives us that Fourth Space, but also that we need to continue to seek diverse membership and cooperation with other organizations and parts of our community.

# THE LATEST ON PUBLIC EDUCATION and the BUDGET: Carol Lenz

The Joint Finance Committee cut 612 items from Governor Evers' budget. Two factors that especially affect public education are the elimination of mental health funding and the healthy meals for all kids. What happens with special education and revenue increases is unknown. A summary of the cuts is available in <a href="Governor Evers">Governor Evers</a>' press release.

During the next phase of the budget process, the JFC will hold hearings for different agencies and departments and gather input to create its own budget. The co-chairs have said they will wait until after seeing the next revenue projections before tackling major areas of the budget.

Once passed through the JFC, the bill will be brought to the Senate and Assembly for passage. The Legislature will then deliver the budget bill to Governor Evers to sign, veto, or partially veto. If the 2025-27 Biennial Budget is not passed by the end of June, the funding levels of the previous budget remain in effect.

As the process moves to the next stage, the coming weeks are critical for public school advocates. It's not too late to get involved. Governor Evers encourages the public to contact members of the JFC and their local state senator and representative.

# Four priorities (of many):

- 1. Increase special education reimbursement to AT LEAST 60%.
- 2. Increase spendable revenue for all students and link to inflation.
- 3. Fund mental health, safety, and healthy meals for all.
- 4. Demand accountability for, and phase out, vouchers.






