President's Page

Hello Friends,

I recently read about how the ancient Greeks thought about time. New York Times writer Melissa Kirsch had some interesting observations that seemed worth sharing.

The Greeks recognized time as we usually think of it, but also the times we describe with phrases such as "the right time," or "the moment of opportunity," or "a golden memory" Doing what just feels right without too much analysis was called <u>Kairos</u> by the Greeks, and they recognized that those moments were there if we are awake and aware enough to realize it. Actual time seems suspended for a bit as friends linger over dinner together, a mother reaches for her newborn, and for us in AAUW as we reflect after book sale and realize that we've been part of a significant event- those are times of Kairos. Time suspended, yet precious.

I hope you were part of the effort to make our book sale a financial and community success, and felt moments of knowing how important your presence was. I experienced Kairos every time I entered the sale and took in the magnitude of our work. And when the clerk from Bath and Body Works came in with bags of sample products that the store staff wanted us to have because of the great event we had brought to them, we shared a brief look around, taking it all in before she rushed back to work. I felt it again when I met our eager young members so excited by the positivity of the sale, and when longtime treasured friends shared a laugh or just a proud look around as we worked. Realizing a shopper was one of our scholarship recipients gave us both a chance to remember why we do this. Kairos feels good!

Last fall, I wrote of the Japanese concept of <u>Ikigai</u>. That term expresses another benefit of your AAUW membership: the feeling that your life is worthwhile, that you are accomplishing good for others with people you care about. Certainly sounds like AAUW to me. Ikigai feels good!

One challenge that is weighing heavily on me, though, is finding members who are willing to help in new ways. It's vital that any organization has members who help out in various ways for various time periods. Fresh faces bring fresh thinking, and that is the hallmark of a healthy branch.

When I was asked to be president, I laughed. I am too old. I have a husband who needs me. I hadn't had a board position in years! It was ridiculous to even consider. And yet. As I thought about the job, I realized it required what I enjoy- talking, writing, and encouraging. I could do a lot of the job at home, set my own schedule. I thought of all of my friends in the branch, and I wanted to add purpose and connection to my life.

Recently, Faye Binsfeld and I (and there were other AAUW members there too!) attended an information session hosted by our fellow non-partisan Women's Action Coalition member, the League of Women Voters of Appleton - Fox Valley. We were there to learn about the "Unite and Rise 8.5" initiative launched by the national LWV. The one goal of this is "to activate 8.5 million people to rise up and take action through peaceful yet powerful civic engagement to defend and preserve our democracy." It was inspiring to see the crowd of ordinary citizens there to learn and show support.


